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Conservation Easements: The Work of the Montana Land Reliance

Monday December 12th, 2016 at 7pm Hope Lutheran Church 2152 W. Graf Street in Bozeman

Conservation easements are one of the most powerful tools to accomplish habitat protection for birds and other wildlife. Join Sacajawea Audubon in welcoming Kathryn Kelly of The Montana Land Reliance and learn about the basic process and benefits of creating conservation easements, the work of The Montana Land Reliance (MLR), and projects that are protecting various habitats for raptors, sage grouse and other birds.

We'll explore the many intersections between the missions and work of Sacajawea Audubon and The Montana Land Reliance and discuss ways in which we can work together to increase conservation and protect more bird habitat lands.

Sacajawea Audubon members have already had connections with MLR through field trips to the Woodson Ranch/Ruby Habitat Foundation in the Ruby Valley and the Granger Ranches in the Madison Valley; both MLR protected properties.

Kathryn Kelly is the Greater Yellowstone Manager with The Montana Land Reliance (MLR), Montana's statewide land trust. She works with landowners to create conservation easements on private lands in the Greater Yellowstone region of Montana. Her additional duties include education and outreach programs, building support for the organization and private land conservation, donor development and fundraising.

Kathryn was raised on a ranch on the banks of the Gallatin River outside Bozeman. She lived in Fairbanks, Alaska for several years and is an alumni of the University of Alaska where she majored in biology. Kathryn had a successful career in real estate, title insurance, escrow administration, management, and teaching in California's Bay Area before returning home to Montana. She's been a longtime activist addressing the increasing development pressure in the Gallatin Valley, protecting the Gallatin River system and agricultural water rights. Before joining the Reliance in 2014, Kathryn was involved with MLR for many years as a supporter and education and outreach volunteer. She and her parents donated conservation easements on the family ranch to MLR in 2001 and 2007. The Kelly Ranch has been the site of two Sacajawea Audubon field trips in 2015 and 2016.

Wild America: A Very Good Read!

The SAS Book Group is reading *Wild America: The Legendary Story of Two Great Naturalists on the Road.* Written by Roger Tory Peterson and James Fisher, *Wild America* tells the story of their 100-day road trip around the continent in 1953. Peterson plans to introduce James Fisher, a leading authority on birds and conservation in England, to the wild lands and animals of America. Fisher would see American with fresh eyes, Peterson says, and "I would see America again through his eyes." Fisher does not disappoint with his vivid writing and memorable observations; Peterson provides the context. The book is illustrated with Peterson's beautiful black and white drawings.

An Early Christmas Gift: Trident-Peregrine Trail Completed



In the spirit of the Holidays, "Yes, Virginia there is a new birding trail at the Missouri Headwaters State Park!"

As many of you may know, over the last several years, Sacajawea Audubon has been leading a coordinated effort between Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks and CRH-Trident (formally Holcim, Inc.) to get a trail constructed that would allow enhanced viewing opportunities of the Missouri River and the adjacent cliffs. In the fall of 2014, Sacajawea partnered with Montana State University's Plant Sciences-Landscape Design studio to have students majoring in landscape architecture develop conceptual master plans for such a trail. Finally after numerous discussions, planning events and even a land ownership dispute, phase one of the trail is a reality.

Construction of phase one of the Trident-Peregrine Trail was started and completed during the last week in October. The trail head is accessible from the parking lot at the Park's boat launch site. From there, the trail traverses flat ground, paralleling the Missouri River for 1/8 miles on both state and private land. Near the trailhead, a short spur trail leads to a small area where a shade structure and picnic table will be located. Close to the end of the trail,

a small designated viewing area will be positioned to provide views of the Missouri River and the limestone cliffs on the opposite side of the river.

Keeping with the primitive designation of the park, the trail consists of packed limestone. Benches and interpretative signs will be installed along the trail as well as at the viewing area. Trailside amenities like interpretative signs and benches along with the shade structure and picnic table will be installed in the spring/early summer 2017.

The trail and its amenities are funded by a grant from the North Western Energy River Trust Fund obtained by Missouri Headwaters State Park. In



addition, besides use of their land, CRH-Trident contributed material, equipment and employee labor towards trail construction. The City of Three Forks contributed employee labor and the use of equipment. Sacajawea members Vickie Backus and John Parker will be working with Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks over the winter on the interpretative signs. There will be an opportunity for other Sacajawea Audubon members to help with the installation of the trailside amenities in 2017.
