ontana's habitat is diverse and filled with 433 species of birds. From Montana's Rocky Mountain peaks in the West to its Great Plains in the East, Montana Audubon is working to conserve these natural ecosystems and safeguard its biological diversity. Join Larry Berrin, executive director of Montana Audubon, as he gives us a glimpse of the State of Montana Birds and bird conservation work across Montana. Including, the recent Montana Audubon River Initiative addressing the need for riparian habitat conservation along rivers and streams across

the state, the citizen science efforts focusing on the Long-billed Curlew Initiative, Black Swift research in Glacier, and the annual Breeding Bird Surveys. The 66th Montana Legislature will convene in January 2019. Montana Audubon will once again take a leading role into researching, strategizing, testifying, and lobbying on bills that affect Montana's wildlife, habitat, and critical environmental laws. Larry will address Montana Audubon's present challenges and successes in passing numerous pieces of legislation to protect wildlife species and habitat.

Larry has been involved in the field of conservation for over 25 years holding such positions as Vermont State Education Director for the National Audubon Society, President/CEO of Asbury Woods Partnership (Pennsylvania) and Director of Conservation Education for Discover Your Northwest where he led the campaign to develop the first Children's Forest in the Northwest—The Deschutes Children's Forest in Oregon. Larry is an avid birder and has led international eco-trips to places such as Mexico, Costa Rica, the Galapagos, the Amazon, and Kenya.

Sacajawea Audubon Society programs are free and open to the public. Our programs feature a special guest speaker the 2nd Monday of each month, September through May, at Hope Lutheran Church, 2152 W. Graf (off of S. 19th). Join us for a social at 6:30 p.m. followed by the program at 7:00 pm.

Sacajawea Audubon would also like to thank everyone who purchased a raptor raffle ticket. The funds raised will go directly to the annual fall Bridger Mountains Raptor Count, started in 1991 by HawkWatch International.

The Bridger Ridge provides viewing of one of the largest Golden Eagle migrations known in the lower 48 states. Recent Golden Eagle count totals have varied from 1,000 to 1,400 eagles per season, with up to 200 individuals tallied on peak migration days (usually during the first two weeks of October).

Data obtained over the last 28 years has provided scientists with valuable information about trends in Golden Eagles and other raptor populations. Sacajawea Audubon, in partnership with HawkWatch International (HWI), is coordinating this scientific project for the second consecutive season.

Sacajawea Audubon's Watch At Home Project

eople living in neighborhoods with more birds, shrubs and trees are less likely to suffer from depression, anxiety and stress according to research by academics at the University of Exeter, the British Trust for Ornithology and the University of Queensland.

In February 2018, Sacajawea Audubon implemented our pilot Watch At Home program at Hyalite Country Care in Bozeman. The Watch At Home project enhances the quality of life for Senior and Disabled citizens by providing and maintaining bird feeders and bird baths at local nursing homes, assisted living facilities or at their homes. This program also provides education materials and presentations.

Debi Naccarto with Wild Birds
Unlimited Bozeman sponsored the
project by donating and installing bird
feeders and a heated bird bath along with
bags of bird seed. After a month, the
birds found the feeders and the residents
of Hyalite Country Care began observing
and documenting the birds coming to
the feeders. Sacajawea Audubon member
Sherry Staub began weekly "bird chats"
during the noon meal time. In addition,



Birds of Southwest Montana and the Changing of Our Climate Workshop

What are scientific models predicting for birds and climate change in Southwest Montana?

"You often hear of climate change being all doom and gloom, but one of the findings is that in winter especially, parks are going to become more important sanctuaries for birds," says Audubon Society avian biologist Joanna Wu. Some birds may even stop migrating if winters are mild enough that they can tolerate local conditions, says Wu.

Sacajawea Audubon Society's Birds of Southwest Montana and the Changing of Our Climate Workshop will look at 5 birds in Southwest Montana and the challenges they have, with regards to patterns of migration or breeding in Montana. What healthy habitats do these migrating and breeding birds need? A dangerous myth is that we simply can't solve the effect of the changing of our climate. That is not true. We will look at what we can do to shape the future of our Bird-friendly Communities. This coffee is not grown in the understory of a

previously cut rain forest. Rain forests are a critical habitat for migratory song birds. No Habitat = No Songbirds.

So, if you enjoy the fresh brewed aroma and flavor of coffee every day...now you know that you are ensuring the future of those bird hikes you also love with every cup.

Birds and Beans is allowing our club to order coffee directly online with NO shipping costs and at a discounted price to Sacajawea Audubon Members and any other conservation group in Bozeman through the Bird City, Wisconsin Coffee Club website!
